JOB POSTING – POSTDOCTORAL FELLOW

Area of Research: Perception/Cognition/Cognitive Neuroscience/Development

Description of duties: The postdoctoral fellow will conduct a developmental cognitive neuroscience research program in the Finn Lab.

Salary: \$40,000 per year, plus benefits.

Required qualifications: Completion of a PhD in a relevant field of study is required. We are seeking a colleague who is interested in understanding how the developing human brain supports learning and memory in different socioeconomic and educational contexts. This collaboration will use neuroimaging to understand how changes in the functional and structural profile of attentional and learning systems relates to learning outcomes both in the lab and in real-world academic settings. The ideal candidate will have experience in cognitive neuroscience, strong quantitative training, and experience working with children.

Application instructions: All individuals interested in this position must submit a brief statement of research, CV, the names of at least two references, and any relevant publications to Dr Amy Finn by the closing date.

Closing date: Review of applications will occur as they are received, and will continue until the position is filled.

Supervisor: Dr. Amy Finn.

Expected start date: As early as January 2018, and ideally before September 1, 2018.

Term: One year, with the possibility of a one year renewal.

FTE: This postdoctoral fellowship is a full-time equivalent position (1.0 FTE)
